Census Collection now includes the 1851, 1901, 1906 and 1911 Census of Canada

Over 13 million Canadians are now searchable in these four databases with the actual census records linked to the results.

The 1851 Census offers a rich source of information about Canada East (Quebec), Canada West (Ontario), New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in the middle of the 19th century. Census records provide many details about individuals and families.

The 1901 census index offers a treasure trove of information including name, marital status, birth date, birth year, year of immigration to Canada, tribal origins, religion, and more. This level of detail helps users increase the likelihood of finding their ancestors.

The 1906 census index includes Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The federal government commissioned a special census of the region after 1901 as a result of explosive population growth during the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The 1911 Census of Canada is searchable by family name and includes the nine provinces that were part of Canada at that time: Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, and Saskatchewan. It also includes: the Yukon Territory and the Northwest Territories.

In addition to the major Canadian censuses, Ancestry Library Edition includes access to the following online collections:

Ontario Marriage Index, 1858-1899: Online index to approximately 884,000 individuals who were married in Ontario between 1858 and 1899.

Ontario Birth Index, 1869-1907: Online index to nearly 1.8 million births that were registered in Ontario between 1869 and 1907.

Ontario Death Index, 1869-1932: Online index to over 1.8 million deaths that were registered in Ontario between 1869 and 1932.

British Columbia Death Index, 1872-1979: Compiled by the British Columbia Vital Statistics Agency and the British Columbia Archives, these vital records are valuable sources for genealogists because they document an individual in a particular place and time, as well as provide details about that person's marriage. Additional information beyond the keyed index may be found on the image.

Canadian Genealogy Index, 1600s-1900s: Database contains over two million records referencing individuals from all regions of Canada, as well as early Alaska. The vast majority of the records fall between 1600 and the mid-to-late 1900s, although some records date before the 1500s.

Canadian Immigrant Records, 1780-1906: Compiled from a variety of sources, this database is a collection of over 270,000 records between 1780 and 1906 relating to immigrants to Canada. Researchers will find the name of the immigrant, year, and source of the original record.

Quebec Vital Records (Drouin Collection), 1621-1967: The Drouin Collection represents the largest and most valuable French-Canadian family history resources available, including an impressive collection of Quebec vital records. The Drouin Collection contains nearly 12 million records from 1621 to the 1940s. It represents all vital records from Quebec—including baptism, marriage and burial—as well as a compilation of church records from Ontario, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and various New England states in America. Both catholic and non-catholic records are included.

Ontario & Nova Scotia Census Records, 1800-1842: Index to various local censuses taken between 1800 and 1842 in Canada, primarily in the Nova Scotia and Ontario provinces.
